## **SUN PROTECTION POLICY**

## **RATIONALE:**

The purpose of the policy is to ensure that all children attend our school are protected from skin damage caused by the harmful ultraviolet rays of the sun.

## **IMPLEMENTATION:**

- 1. As part of general skin-protection strategies:
  - 1.1 Children will wear hats which protect the face, neck and ears whenever they are outside eg. sports, sports carnivals, outdoor excursions and activities (applies across all terms).
  - 1.2 Children will be encouraged to use available areas of shade for outdoor play activities.
  - 1.3 Class outdoor activities will be held in areas of shade whenever possible
  - 1.4 Teachers will schedule outdoor activities before 10.00am (11.00am daylight saving time) whenever possible unless using covered areas.
  - 1.5 Staff will be encouraged to act as role models by practising SunSmart behaviour:
    - \* Wearing protective hats and appropriate clothing for all outdoor activities
    - Seeking shade wherever possible

- 2. Our School will:
  - 2.1 Promote hats and clothing which satisfy Cancer Council guidelines as part of its uniform. No hat, no play policy in the sun implemented.
  - 2.2 Encourage children to seek whatever shade is provided at sporting carnivals and outdoor events when possible eg. between games
  - 2.3 Provide more shelters and shade trees. Continue to upgrade and maintain shelters and plant more trees.
  - 2.4 Incorporate programs on skin cancer prevention in its curriculum.
  - 2.5 Reinforce regularly the SunSmart Policy in a positive way through newsletters, parent meetings, student and teacher activities.
  - 3. When enrolling a child, parents will be:
    - 3.1 Informed of the SunSmart Policy.
    - 3.2 Requested to purchase a school hat.
    - 3.3 Encouraged to model skin-protection behaviour themselves.
- 4 The sun protection plan will be reviewed along with other school policies. The school's sun protection statement / action plan will be re-submitted to the Cancer Council every 3 years.
