PLAN What does it Mean?

In the semester one and two reports, the PLAN parent report is included. The PLAN parent report is a product of the PLAN software that the school uses to track student learning. To explain; a student's learning is tracked on a continuum from Kindergarten to year 10 in the areas of numeracy and literacy. In literacy, a student's learning is broken into eight specific areas such as comprehension, phonics and reading texts. In numeracy a student's learning is broken into areas such as fractions, place value and counting. In both literacy and numeracy, the learning continuum is broken into clusters, with students being plotted on a cluster based on the skills they demonstrate. For example, a student might be on cluster 8 in comprehension and cluster 8 in writing. For a year two child, that is within their expected level. The intention of the report is to give parents an accurate snap shot of exactly where the child is at and then give ideas how to help their child further along the learning continuum. The PLAN parent report replaces a teacher comment for those areas as it is felt the information being given is far more detailed and comprehensive than what can be conveyed in a short written comment. The PLAN parent report is included in the general school report to complement the information and to further enhance a parents' understanding of their child's performance. As is always the case, if parents need further information, make an appointment see your child's teacher.


A big congratulation to Leanne Fitzsimmons and Lisa Matthews who will be the Thornton School Council representative for 2017/2018.

Our Band Hard at Work!




15,878 What?

What is a waste-free lunch?

Waste free lunches contain only items that are eaten, composted or recycled. They don't contain wrappers or packaging that will be thrown away in the rubbish bin. Using reusable containers and drink bottles is the cornerstone of a waste-free lunch! Reusable containers with different compartments will keep sandwiches intact and make treats easy to pack.

Waste-free lunches are easy. Pack lunches in the evening. Put leftovers from dinner directly into your box. Stock up on easy-to-pack, healthy foods, such as fresh fruits, vegetables and whole grains. Buying items such as juice, yogurt, crackers and biscuits and cheese in bulk quantities or containers, rather than individual servings, will probably save you money as well as reduce waste.

Why pack a waste-free lunch?

- Less waste being sent to landfill. Landfills are reaching capacity and incineration creates air pollution.
- Empower our kids to make positive changes for the planet.
- Eliminate the need for processed, pre-packaged foods.

Importantly, these packs are professionally prepared and meet all Defence and host nation transport and import requirements. Donations to the RSL Australian Forces Overseas Fund can be made at www.rsl.org.au/Support-Us. Donations over \$2 are tax deductible and every donation is individually acknowledged by the RSL.

For members of the public who still wish to send general care parcels to deployed personnel over the Christmas 2016 period, the Australian Forces Post Office address below will be open from Monday 7 November to Wednesday 7 December 2016.

In order to ensure an equitable distribution of parcels it is requested that all donations be gender-neutral, and be addressed to 'An Australian Defence Member', not to a specific job title, trade or unit member.

To ensure that all items are able to be delivered to our deployed forces, donors are asked to ensure that packages contain non-perishable goods only. Previous experience has shown that items that are not robustly packaged can break open during transit, which can lead to infestation and spoilage of perishable goods. Please ensure that parcels do not contain alcohol, tobacco, pornography or culturally offensive / inappropriate written material.

Defence will cover the cost of postage up to a cubed weight of 2kg to all operational zones using an Australia Post "Bx2" box. For items exceeding 2kg, the full cost will need to be covered by the individual posting the item.




